Academy bell tower finally returned to its perch

BRANFORD » Back in October came the news that a crew of skilled workers from M.N. Reale Construction of Branford had painstakingly removed the creaky 194-year-old bell tower from The Academy, the oldest structure on the Branford Green, for restoration.

It would be re-introduced to its perch in approximately 30 days, well in time for its 200th anniversary party in 2020, it was reported.

If, that is, all went well, said Bill O'Brien of the venerable Academy on the Green Commission.

Months went by. Finally, on the morning of Friday, May 29, a crane, guided by Reale's crew, raised the cupola onto eight 16-foot col-

A number of factors conspired in the delay. First was the woeful shape of the building. It was water-damaged, according to builder Matt Reale, with different parts patched together over the years falling away like a wet carton.

Any dreams of restoration went out the window. At M.N. Reale's Meadow Street shop, the crew scrupulously labored over the damaged areas and cleaned the copper. Master craftsman Jeff Haynes of J&R Haynes LLC milled new columns to replace the decaying ones, chiseling them "to within an eighth of an inch of the original," Reale said.

Then there was Mother Nature, punishing the town with a long winter, then softening and muddying the ground through
