Janice Ingarra, Kathy Kessler,

as the Sin Sisters, can pull off
anything - from 1940s Andrews



Or perhaps because they don't have a manager keeping track of their schedule, reminding them of their Thursday-night rehearsals, and updating their website. Or a publicist issuing press releases. Their roadie? Patti Rahl's husband Don, who coincidentally plays a mean bass guitar and who was setting up the band's equipment three or four hours before their show at La Luna.

Call them no frills, grass-roots, homegrown: Kessler, a familiar sight behind the counter at Branford's main post office, first became acquainted with Ingarra

in their kindergarten playhouse and Rahl met the two as the three sin-sistered their way through Sacred Heart Academy in Hamden.

But once you hear their lightning-quick vocal syncopations in
Aretha Franklin's "Rock Steady";
once you witness them belt out
"Twist and Shout' with a truckload of sass and sets of killer
pipes to back up their attitude;
once feel your spine chill and
your heart warm to Patti Rahl's
searing rendition of the Patsy
Cline standard "Crazy," you'll
understand why the Sin Sisters

last 25 years. Because on whatever night you catch them, on whatever stage, you'll realize that these are musicians in full command of their craft.

"Best band we have coming through here," said La Luna owner Edgar Ortiz, gesturing at drummer Mike Vandermaelen pushing the beat of Lady Gaga's pulsating "Just Dance."

Added longtime fan Ginny Ruszczyk of East Haven, smiling as Kessler and Rahl engaged in good-natured banter about their holiday shopping woes: "They've known each other forever, they've been together forever, and they just plain enjoy singing with each other. And

wherever they go, people just respond to that."

As you lose yourself in the Sin Sisters' rich purity of tone; their impeccable sense of rhythm; the fluidity with which they glide from hit to hit, it's easy to forget that they're three working moms who happen to be blessed with the talent to carry a tune far better than the rest of us and the staying power to sustain their range and versatility for so many years.

Until, in the middle of a monster riff by lead guitarist Ricky Jordan, Kessler discreetly steps away and checks her iPhone.

It was a text from her daughter, she said later. Letting her know she was home from a date.
